

Ninth Circuit Judicial Conference

GENERAL INFORMATION

THE PURPOSE OF THE CONFERENCE

The Ninth Circuit Judicial Conference meets annually pursuant to Section 333 of Title 28 of the United States Code:

The chief judge of each circuit may summon biennially, and may summon annually, the circuit, district and bankruptcy judges of the circuit, in active service, to a conference at a time and place that he designates, for the purpose of considering the business of the courts and advising means of improving the administration of justice within such circuit. He may preside at such conference, which shall be known as the Judicial Conference of the circuit. The judges of the District Court of Guam, the District Court of the Virgin Islands, and the District Court of the Northern Mariana Islands may also be summoned biennially, and may be summoned annually, to the conferences of their respective circuits.

Every judge summoned may attend.

The court of appeals for each circuit shall provide by its rules for representation and active participation at such conference by members of the bar of such circuit.

The Order of the Judicial Council of the Ninth Circuit sets forth three purposes of the conference:

To consider the business of the courts in the Ninth Circuit.

To advise means of improving the administration of justice in the Ninth Circuit.

To assist in implementing decisions made by competent authority as to the administration of the business of the courts in the Ninth Circuit.

The names of the Judicial Council members are listed in the Appendix. All conference members are expected to participate actively in the business of the conference.

ORGANIZATION OF THE CONFERENCE

The governing body of the Conference is the Conference Executive Committee, consisting of elected representatives from each group comprising the Conference.

THE COMPOSITION OF THE CONFERENCE

The Conference is composed of circuit, district, bankruptcy and magistrate judges of the circuit; circuit, district and bankruptcy court clerks, together with the Lawyer Representatives Coordinating Committee (LRCC), lawyer representatives, appellate lawyer representatives, the Advisory Board, United States attorneys, federal and community public defenders, chief pretrial services and chief probation officers.

HOSPITALITY AND OPTIONAL GUEST ACTIVITIES

Spouses and guests accompanying Conference members are welcome to attend all general sessions except Breakfast with the Bench which involves assigned seating and procedural discussions between the bench and bar. Please make use of the Hospitality Room in the Statue Garden that will be available Tuesday and Wednesday from 8:30 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. Conference-wide social functions are scheduled for Monday and Wednesday evenings. Optional guest activities have been reserved in advance. Please inquire at the Conference Registration and Information Desk about the availability of these activities. Want to do some exploring on your own? Walk about ten minutes across the boardwalk to Whalers Village, where town shuttles will take you into Lahaina and back for one dollar. Any sightseeing or additional recreational opportunities may be arranged by contacting the hotel's concierge service at (808) 667-4727.

A NOTE ON GOVERNMENT FUNDING

The Ninth Circuit has been allocated a limited amount of federal government funds to conduct the business portions of the Conference. These funds are restricted to covering the travel and lodging of business speakers, the printing and production of business materials and publications, and the rental of audiovisual equipment for business meetings and general sessions. Government funds are not used for spouse programs, or any social and sports activities of the Conference.

THE KĀ'ANAPALI COAST

Monarchy Ballroom Each year the Conference presents a session for lawyers and judges to get together to discuss issues of common concern regarding the administration of justice within the Ninth Circuit. Last year lawyers identified three areas of concern: (1) delay; (2) judicial temperament; and (3) "local-local" rules. In response to suggestions, this year's program has expanded audience discussion time and reduced the number of speakers. The audience will respond to questions on the Audience Response Systems [ARS] and speakers will lead discussions about using Early Neutral Evaluation [ENE], using Rule 16 Case Management Conferences to manage the costs and delays of litigation and recent efforts by the Ninth Circuit's Case Management Committee to help litigants and judges resolve matters in less time. AWARD RECIPIENTS

AMERICAN INNS OF COURT 2010 NINTH CIRCUIT PROFESSIONALISM AWARD HOWARD D. MCKIBBEN, SENIOR DISTRICT JUDGE, DISTRICT OF NEVADA



Affectionately referred to as “Humble Howard,” Senior District Judge Howard D. McKibben is highly respected as a mentor to attorneys and trusted adviser to his colleagues on the bench. His dedicated work with the Inns of Court is well recognized and symbolized by the recent renaming of the Nevada American Inn of Court in Las Vegas to the Howard D. McKibben Inn of Court in his honor. He was one of the founders of the Bruce R. Thompson Inn of Court in Reno and has fostered standards of professionalism that have resulted in improvements to the quality of the bar in the District of Nevada.

Howard D. McKibben was appointed United States District Judge for the District of Nevada by President Ronald Reagan in October, 1984. He was Chief Judge of the District between 1999 to 2003 and assumed senior status on April 1, 2005. After graduating in 1958 from ROVA High School, Oneida, Illinois, Judge McKibben obtained his B.S. in political science in 1962 from Bradley University, where he was president of the student body and a member of the track team. He then attended the University of Pittsburgh Graduate School of Public and International Affairs and obtained a Masters Degree in 1964. He received his J.D. from the University of Michigan Law School in 1967. He was admitted in 1968 to the Nevada Bar where he was in private practice until he was elected District Attorney of Douglas County in 1970. He served as District Attorney from 1971 to 1977. Governor O’Callaghan appointed Judge McKibben to the Nevada Ninth Judicial District Court where he served from 1977 -1984. Judge McKibben has served as President of the Ninth Circuit District Judges Association and the Nevada District Judges Association. He has been a member of the Ninth Circuit Judicial Council and was the Chairman of the Ninth Circuit Jury Committee. Judge McKibben is the former Chairman of the Judicial Conference of the United States Committee on Federal-State Jurisdiction, having been appointed to that position by the late Chief Justice William Rehnquist. He served as a member of the Nevada State Board of Bar Examiners.

As a member of the faculty of the National Judicial College in Reno, he taught judges throughout the nation for many years. He has participated with the American Bar Association’s Central and Eastern European Law Initiative Program and has participated in judicial education programs in Eastern Europe.

Members of the bench and bar admire Judge McKibben's example of treating everyone with fairness and dignity and his deep respect for the judicial process and the legal system. In addition to his contributions to the advancement of the profession in Nevada, Judge McKibben's admirers speculate that his most satisfying accomplishment reflects his warm heart: his work to establish the China Springs Youth Camp, which combines wilderness, education, and work release programs for youth offenders.

ADR LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

HON. DOROTHY W. NELSON, SENIOR CIRCUIT JUDGE



Judge Dorothy W. Nelson has been a prime mover in mediation leadership since her days in 1957 as the first woman faculty member of the University of Southern California Law School. Holding strong personal and religious beliefs in the process of consultation to resolve conflicts peacefully (Judge Nelson is a member of the Bahá'í Faith and served on the National Spiritual Assembly till 2009.),

she noted that everyone on the faculty appeared to accept the "adversary system" as a given and no courses or materials were offered in the field of alternative dispute resolution. She inserted materials on mediation, the closest thing to consultation, in her seminar on the administration of justice. Chided by her colleagues with some amusement that she was teaching a "woman's thing," Judge Nelson has great satisfaction in observing that alternative dispute resolution (particularly mediation) is one of the hottest topics in the justice system today.

Nominated by President Carter, Judge Nelson was appointed to the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit on December 20, 1979, and assumed senior status on January 1, 1995. Prior to her appointment, Judge Nelson became the first woman dean of a major American law school in 1967 when she was named Dean of USC Law School. In addition to her academic and judicial trailblazing, Judge Nelson was one of the early proponents of alternative dispute resolution and believed that mediation was a viable alternative to litigation. She helped establish a dispute resolution center at USC Law School in 1967 which was the first dispute resolution center in a law school anywhere in the country.

Judge Nelson is a founder and current chair of the Board of Directors of the Western Justice Center, a Pasadena, California-based organization that focuses on conflict prevention and resolution for children, communities and courts. Since its founding, the Western Justice Center Foundation has developed a

number of programs designed to teach peaceful conflict resolution to children, youth, parents, teachers, administrators and community members. Recently, the Foundation collaborated with the Pasadena Police Department and the Los Angeles County Bar Association Dispute Resolution Services to launch a mediation and dialogue program designed to improve relationships between the police department and the community. It combines individual mediations of citizen complaints against the police and larger dialogues between community members and members of the Pasadena Police Department.

As the first Chair of the Ninth Circuit's ADR Committee beginning in December 1997 and ending this past April 30, Judge Nelson continued to make significant contributions to ADR from the bench. For this, and everything else she has contributed, the Ninth Circuit honors her with the ADR Lifetime Achievement Award.

JOHN P. FRANK AWARD

PAUL L. (LARRY) WESTBERG



Larry Westberg grew up in north Idaho. He attended the University of Idaho, graduating from the College of Law in 1968; and was admitted to the Idaho State Bar and the U.S. District Court that same year. He was later admitted to practice before the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals as well as the United States Supreme Court. Following law school, Larry was a law clerk for the Hon. Fred M. Taylor, U.S. District Court for the District of Idaho, and later was district counsel for the U.S. Small Business Administration in Boise. He later was district counsel for four years in the U.S. Attorney's Office in Boise where he gained a reputation as one of the most skilled litigators. He was admired for taking a complex factual and legal case and presenting it in an understandable manner to a jury. Larry quickly became a mentor to many younger U.S. attorneys who today still carry with them his guidance on proper case preparation and trial techniques. Most importantly, Larry was that rare prosecutor that could both zealously prosecute a case and at the same time, ensure that the rights of the accused were never abused or disregarded.

Larry is widely regarded as one of the premier criminal defense attorneys in the District of Idaho. He has participated in efforts to improve the fair and efficient administration of justice in Idaho by serving on the Criminal Procedural Orders Committee, serving as a Criminal Justice Act Panel attorney, and as the Criminal Justice Act National Representative to the American Bar Association. He is an original member of the Idaho Association of Criminal Defense Attorneys and of the National Association of Criminal Defense Attorneys.

His bar leadership role has not been restricted solely to areas involving criminal law. He is regarded by his colleagues as exceptionally hard-working, always collegial and genuinely committed to public service. Larry has been recognized by his colleagues as a natural leader. He served as a lawyer representative to the Ninth Circuit. Larry has supported continuing legal education by volunteering to serve as the Chair of the Fund Development Committee for the Idaho Law Foundation. He is a Charter Member of the Boise Inn of Court and has served as its president. He is also a founding member of the Idaho Legal History Society and serves on the society's board of directors.

Larry was instrumental in organizing the Idaho Chapter of the Federal Bar Association and served as the chapter's first president attesting to his leadership and the respect he enjoys throughout the legal profession.

NINTH CIRCUIT ADR EDUCATION AWARD

The University of Washington School of Law has thoroughly integrated alternative dispute resolution into its educational program, from basic curriculum through advanced courses. Among J.D. graduates, 50 percent have taken basic negotiations or an ADR survey course, and more than 25 percent were enrolled in a more specialized, related course offering. Beyond the classroom, the school offers ADR clinical programs, including a Mediation Clinic that provides intensive training, followed by actual mediation of small claims, landlord-tenant, workplace and consumer-merchant disputes, and inter-personal conflicts. Faculty and students also participate in a two-day Northwest Dispute Resolution Conference held on campus each spring, and the school sponsors student teams competing in local, national and international contests focusing on arbitration, mediation and negotiation.

SPEAKERS, PANELISTS & SPECIAL GUESTS



Steven B. Andersen is a trial lawyer whose practice emphasis is tort and business litigation including products liability, professional negligence, personal injury and all types of commercial litigation. He has lectured on topics of trial preparation and advocacy and has published materials and articles on legal ethics, discovery techniques and trials, including the book How to Prepare For, Take and Use a Deposition (James Publishing 1995). Mr. Andersen has been in private practice since 1982 and a partner with Holland & Hart LLP since 1987. He received both his B.A. *summa cum laude* in 1977 and his J.D. with honors in 1980 from Brigham Young University.



Senior District Judge Marvin E. Aspen was appointed to the United States District Court for the Northern District of Illinois in 1979 and served as Chief Judge from July 1, 1995 to June 30, 2002. Judge Aspen has served as a member of the Judicial Conference of the United States and as Chair of the District Judge Representatives to the JCUS. He served as Chair of the Committee on Civility of the Seventh Federal Judicial Circuit. The Committee promulgated civility standards that were adopted by the Seventh Circuit and by courts and bar associations nationally. From 1971 until his appointment to the U.S. District Court, Judge Aspen was a judge of the Circuit Court of Cook County. Before his appointment to the state court, he was on the staff of Corporation Counsel, Chicago, where he served as Head of the Appeals and Review Division, handling more than 100 appeals in state and federal appellate courts, including the Supreme Court of the United States. Judge Aspen received a B.S. in sociology from Loyola University, Chicago, in 1955 and his J.D. from Northwestern University School of Law in 1958. He taught evidence, criminal law, trial technique and municipal law at Northwestern University School of law for nearly three decades and has lectured in law schools throughout the country.



Magistrate Judge Anthony J. Battaglia was

nominated on May 20, 2010 by President Obama to be a district court judge for the Southern District of California. He has been a U.S. Magistrate Judge since 1993. Judge Battaglia serves as the Magistrate Judge Observer to the Judicial Conference of the United States from 2009 to 2011 and was on the JCUS Advisory Committee on Rules of Criminal Procedure from 2003 to 2009. From 1974 to 1993, Judge Battaglia engaged in private practice specializing in plaintiff's personal injury litigation with emphasis on products liability and maritime injury claims. He received his B.A. from the United States International University in 1971 and his J.D. from the Western School of Law in 1974.



Jeffrey D. Bauman is Professor of Law and Co-Director, Center for the Study of the Legal Profession, at Georgetown University Law Center. Professor Bauman's specialty is corporate law. Before joining the Law Center in 1973, he spent four years at the Securities and Exchange Commission and five years in private practice. In addition, he has served on the Executive Council of the Securities Law Committee

of the Federal Bar Association and the Committee on Federal Regulation of Securities of the American Bar Association. In addition to several law journal articles on rule 10b-5, Prof. Bauman also co-authored casebooks on Corporations, Legal Ethics and Corporate Practice. He received his LL.B. from Yale Law School, and a B.A. and M.A. from Yale University.



District Judge Susan R. Bolton was appointed to the U.S.

District Court for the District of Arizona on October 13, 2000. Prior to her appointment to the federal bench, she served as a judge for the Arizona Superior Court, Maricopa County, from 1989 to 2000. Judge Bolton was in private practice as an associate with the law firm of Shimmel, Hill, Bishop & Gruender, P.C., from 1977 to 1982, and was a partner from 1982 to 1989. She clerked for the late Judge Laurance T. Wren of the Arizona Court of Appeals from 1975 to 1977. Judge Bolton received her B.A. from the University of Iowa in 1973 and her J.D. from the University of Iowa College of Law in 1975. She was Chair, Ninth Circuit Jury Trial Improvement Committee, from 2002 to 2008 and presently serves on the Ninth Circuit Judicial Conference Executive Committee and Space and Security Committee. She maintains chambers in Phoenix.

District Judge Leonie M. Brinkema has served on the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Virginia since October 1993, during which time she has presided over several high-profile terrorism cases, including *United States v. Zacarias Moussaoui* and *United States v. Lyman Faris*. Before becoming a district court judge, Judge Brinkema was a U.S. Magistrate Judge for eight years, served as an Assistant U.S. Attorney in the Eastern District of Virginia for six years, and was in private practice for a year. Judge Brinkema is the author of “Judicial Review in the Federal Courts in Virginia,” published by the Virginia Law Foundation. She presented the 2008 John Marshall Harlan ’20 Lecture in Constitutional Adjudication at Princeton University on “Terrorism Cases in Civilian Courts: Balancing the Powers of Government. Judge Brinkema received her J.D. *cum laude* from Cornell Law School in 1976, her Master’s Degree in library service from Rutgers University Graduate School of Library Service in 1970 and her B.A. in philosophy, Phi Beta Kappa, from Douglass College in 1966. She also attended New York University for graduate studies in philosophy from 1967 to 1969.



James J. Brosnahan has 50 years of expertise in both civil and criminal trial work. He has tried more than 140 cases to verdict, including many high-profile cases involving anti-trust and competition law, securities litigation, enforcement and white-collar criminal defense. He is a senior partner in the San Francisco office of Morrison Foerster. Mr. Brosnahan has received numerous awards and recognition throughout his distinguished career. In 2007, he was the recipient of the American Inns of Court Lewis F. Powell Award for Professionalism and Ethics. He received his B.A. and M.A. from Boston College in 1956 and his LL.B. from Harvard Law School in 1959.

D. James Greiner is Assistant Professor of Law at Harvard Law School and he teaches courses on civil procedure, expert witnesses and voting regulation. Before joining the faculty in 2007, Prof. Greiner completed his Ph.D. in statistics at Harvard University. Prior to this, he practiced law for six years, three for the Department of Justice (Programs Branch), and three for Jenner & Block. Associate Justice Anthony M. Kennedy was born in Sacramento, California, on July 23, 1936. He married Mary Davis and has three children. He was in private practice in San Francisco, California from 1961 to 1963, as well as in Sacramento, California, from 1963 to 1975. He has served in numerous positions during his career, including a member of the California Army National Guard in 1961, the board of the Federal Judicial Center from 1987 to 1988, and two JCUS committees: the Advisory Panel on Financial Disclosure Reports and Judicial Activities, subsequently renamed the Advisory Committee on Codes of Conduct, from 1979 to 1987, and the Committee on Pacific Territories from 1979 to 1990, which he chaired from 1982 to 1990. He was appointed to the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit in 1975. President Reagan nominated him as an associate justice of the Supreme Court, and he took his seat on February 18, 1988.

Chief Circuit Judge Alex Kozinski was appointed United States Circuit Judge for the Ninth Circuit on November 7, 1985. He was elevated to chief judge of the circuit on November 30, 2007. He graduated from UCLA, receiving an A.B. degree in 1972, and from UCLA Law School, receiving a J.D. degree in 1975. Prior to his appointment to the appellate bench, Judge Kozinski served as Chief Judge of the United States Claims Court, 1982 to 1985; Special Counsel, Merit Systems Protection Board, 1981 to 1982; Assistant Counsel, Office of Counsel to the President, 1981; Deputy Legal Counsel, Office of President-Elect Reagan, 1980 to 1981; Attorney, Covington & Burling, 1979 to 1981; Attorney, Forry Golbert Singer & Gelles, 1977 to 1979; Law Clerk to Chief Justice Warren E. Edward B. MacMahon, Jr. was lead counsel in the case of *United States vs. al-Timimi*, an American citizen who was charged with soliciting others to levy war against the United States after the September 11th attacks. In 2005, Dr. al-Timimi was convicted on all counts and sentenced to life in prison plus 70 years. He also was lead trial counsel for Zacarias Moussaoui, the French citizen labeled the “20th Hijacker.”

Although the government sought the death penalty in that case, a jury ultimately elected to spare his life after a three-month jury trial. He also represented Walid Bin-Attash in a Military Commission case once pending in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. Mr. Bin-Attash is Khalid Sheikh Mohammed’s co-defendant. Mr. MacMahon has been practicing criminal law since 1986. He received his B.A. from University of Virginia in 1982 and his J.D. from Tulane University School of Law in 1985. He served as law clerk to Senior District Judge Claude M. Hilton of the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Virginia.



District Judge A. Howard Matz was appointed U.S. District Judge for the Central District of California on July 10, 1998. Before that, he had been a partner in Bird, Marella, Boxer, Wolpert & Matz, a Los Angeles, California, law firm engaged only in litigation. He received his undergraduate degree Columbia College, graduating *cum laude* in 1965 and his J.D. from Harvard Law School in 1968. From 1969

to 1970, Judge Matz served as law clerk for the late District Judge Morris E. Lasker, of the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of New York. In 1970, he began to practice law with the New York-based firm Hughes Hubbard & Reed. He moved to California in 1972 to help establish that firm’s Los Angeles office. From 1974 to 1978, Judge Matz served as Assistant United States Attorney in the Central District of California, and was Chief of the Fraud and Special Prosecutions Section. He returned to Hughes Hubbard & Reed as a partner in 1979 and remained in that position until he helped form the Bird, Marella, Boxer, Wolpert & Matz firm in 1983. Before his appointment to the federal bench, Judge Matz was active in many civic and professional organizations. Judge Matz has served on the Ninth Circuit’s Committee on Model Jury Instructions, and on the Ninth Circuit’s Public Interest and Community Outreach (PICO) Committee. In 2009, the State Bar of California named him as the first recipient of the Vanguard Award for his contributions to intellectual property jurisprudence.



Mary Campbell McQueen has been President of the National Center for State Courts since August 9, 2004. Previously, McQueen served as Washington State Court Administrator from 1987 to 2004; Director of Judicial Services, Washington State Office of the Administrator for the Courts, from 1979 to 1987; Court Planning Officer, District of Columbia Courts; Planning Coordinator, Kentucky Department of Justice; and Manager, Evaluation Unit, Kentucky Department of Corrections. As an advocate for court and judicial reform, she has served on numerous national and state committees including the Board of Directors of the National Center for State Courts and Conference of State Court Administrators, President from 1995 to 1996; and was Chair, American Bar Association's Judicial Administration Division (Lawyers Conference), in addition to Chair of the Court Management Council. Ms. McQueen's work has been acclaimed through numerous awards and honors, including induction into the Warren E. Burger Society of the National Center for State Courts and the American Judicature Society's Herbert Harley Award in 2004. She participated in the Program for Senior Executives in State and Local Government, John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University; and received degrees from the University of Georgia (B.A.) and Seattle University Law School (J.D.). She is a member of the U.S. Supreme Court and Washington State Bar associations.



Chief Bankruptcy Judge Randall J. Newsome has been a U.S. Bankruptcy Judge since his appointment to the bench in Cincinnati, Ohio, in October of 1982. He was reappointed to a 14-year term in 1986. He applied for and was appointed to another 14-year term in the Northern District of California in Oakland in June of 1988, and was reappointed in June of 2002. He became chief bankruptcy judge of the Northern District of California in January of 2004. Judge Newsome received a B.A. from Boston University, graduating *summa cum laude*, in 1972 and a J.D. from the University of Cincinnati College of Law in 1975. He was a law clerk for the late District Judge Carl B. Rubin of the District Court from the Southern District of New York from 1975 to 1977. From 1978 to 1982 he practiced law at Dinsmore & Shohl in Cincinnati. He served as President of the National Conference of Bankruptcy Judges from 1998 to 1999. He is a fellow of the American College of Bankruptcy and is a member of the American Law Institute. He regularly serves as a faculty member for the Federal Judicial Center, American Law Institute, American Bar Association, and other organizations. He has testified before committees

of Congress on bankruptcy reform legislation. He is a contributing author to Collier on Bankruptcy and Chapter 11: Theory and Practice (Lexis-Nexis 2009).



William J. Perlstein is co-managing partner of Wilmer Hale and a partner in the firm's Bankruptcy and Financial Restructuring Practice Group. He joined what was then Wilmer, Cutler & Pickering in 1975 and became a partner in 1982, starting the firm's bankruptcy practice as a last-year associate in 1981. Prior to her appointment, Judge Rothstein was a Washington Superior Court judge, King County, from 1977 to 1980. She was an adjunct professor at the University of Washington Law School from 1975 to 1977. Judge Rothstein received her B.A. from Cornell University in 1960 and her LL.B. from Harvard Law School in 1966.



Christopher H. Schroeder was nominated by President Obama to serve as an Assistant Attorney General in the Office of Legal Policy (OLP) on June 4, 2009. He was confirmed by the Senate on April 21, 2010. Mr. Schroeder served as an Acting Assistant Attorney General in the Office of Legal Counsel during the Clinton Administration. Prior to that, he held several staff positions with the Senate Judiciary Committee, including the position of Chief Counsel from 1992 to 1993. Before joining the Obama Administration, Mr. Schroeder was the Charles S. Murphy Professor of Law and Professor of Public Policy Studies, Director of the Public Law Program at Duke University. His academic research and writing concentrate in the areas of environmental law and constitutional law. He co-authors a leading environmental law casebook, Environmental Regulation: Law, Science and Policy (Sixth Edition, New York, Aspen 2009), with Robert Percival, Alan Miller and James Leape. He has also co-authored *Keeping Faith with the Constitution* (American Constitution Society for Law and Policy 2010) with Goodwin Liu and Pamela Karlan, as well as Presidential Power Stories (Foundation Press 2009) with Curtis Bradley. The Assistant Attorney General for the Office of Legal Policy serves as the primary policy advisor to the Attorney General and the Deputy Attorney General. Further, OLP advises and assists the President and the Attorney General in the selection and confirmation of federal judges. It oversees the Department's process for vetting, interviewing, evaluating and seeking confirmation of the nation's judiciary, in close consultation with the White House Counsel. Schroeder received his B.A. from Princeton University in 1968, an M. Div. from Yale University in 1971, and a J.D. from University of California, Berkeley (Boalt Hall) in 1974.



Circuit Judge Mary M. Schroeder is the first woman to serve as chief judge of the Ninth Circuit from 2000 to 2007. Nominated to the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit by President Carter, she was confirmed by the Senate in 1979. Prior to coming onto the federal bench, Judge Schroeder sat on the Arizona Court of Appeals from 1975 to 1979. She engaged in private practice with the law firm of Lewis and Roca in Phoenix, where she was the first woman to become a partner in a major law firm. She maintains chambers in Phoenix.



Leonard B. Simon is Of Counsel to the firm Rudman, Geller, Robbins & Dowd in San Diego. He was a managing partner in that firm's predecessor firm for many years. Mr. Simon also teaches at University of San Diego and Duke law schools. He practices in the area of complex civil litigation, particularly class actions in the securities, antitrust and consumer fields. He has also handled many appeals at the Ninth Circuit and other federal courts of appeal, the California Courts of Appeal, and the U.S. Supreme Court. Mr. Simon has also handled legal matters involving the sports industry and is co-owner of a minor league baseball team. He is a member of the Ninth Circuit's Conference Executive Committee.



Circuit Judge Milan D. Smith, Jr., was nominated by President George W. Bush on February 14, 2006. Rated "Well Qualified" by the American Bar Association's Standing Committee on the Federal Judiciary, he was unanimously confirmed by the United States Senate on May 16, 2006, and his commission was issued on May 18, 2006. Judge Smith took the oath of office as United States Circuit Judge on June 30, 2006. He was an honors graduate of Brigham Young University, B.A., *cum laude*, 1966, and received his J.D., 1969, at the University of Chicago Law School where he received a full tuition National Honor Scholarship from 1966 to 1969. While in private practice, Judge Smith was an associate with O'Melveny & Myers, Los Angeles from 1969 to 1972; Vice Chair, California Fair Employment and Housing Commission from 1987 to 1991; General Counsel, 1991 to 2006; Founding and Managing Partner, Smith & Hilbig, LLP, 1972 to 1996; Managing Partner, Smith Crane Robinson and Parker, LLP, 1996 to 2006. He was Chair, Real Property Finance Subsection of the Real Property Finance Subsection of the Real Property Section of the State Bar of California from 1982 to 1983. He maintains chambers in El Segundo, California. Judge Smith is a member of the Conference Executive Committee.



Circuit Judge N. Randy Smith was appointed a circuit judge for the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit on March 19, 2007. Previously, he married La Dean Egbert. He attended Utah State University and Brigham Young University, receiving his B.S. from Brigham Young University in 1974 and his J.D. from the J. Reuben Clark School of Law at Brigham Young University in 1977. Prior to his appointment to the appellate bench, he served as Corporate Counsel to the J.R. Simplot Company, 1977-1981; as Partner, Merrill & Merrill, Chartered, 1982-1995; as Idaho Sixth District Judge, 1996-2007, Idaho Sixth District Administrative Judge, (2004-2007), Sixth District Felony Drug Court Judge (2002-2007) and was awarded the George G. Granada Award (highest Idaho judicial award for outstanding professionalism) in 2004; was named Idaho Statesman of the Year in 2005. Throughout his career, he has taught on College of Business faculties at Brigham Young University (1973-77), Boise State University (1977-1982), and Idaho State University (1984 to present), teaching accounting, tax law, legal environment of business, and business law and was awarded the Outstanding Teaching Award (2004-2005). He maintains his chambers in Pocatello, Idaho. This is Judge Smith's second term on the Conference Executive Committee (having previously served as a lawyer representative, 1991-1995) and is now program chair of the 2010 Ninth Circuit Judicial Conference.



Robert A. Spencer is Vice President and Deputy General Counsel at Lockheed Martin Corporation in Bethesda, Maryland. He previously served as Vice President and Associate General Counsel for Litigation and Compliance from 2006 to 2009. Mr. Spencer joined Lockheed Martin in July 2006 from the United States Attorney's Office, Eastern District of Virginia, where he served as an Assistant U.S.

Attorney since 1995. While at the U.S. Attorney's Office, Mr. Spencer prosecuted terrorism and espionage cases, including *United States v. Zacarias Moussaoui* and *United States v. Squillacote*, and all manner of economic and violent crimes. He also served as Co-Chief of the Assistant Attorney General's 9/11 Task Force following the September 11th terrorist attacks. From 1991 to 1994, he worked at the Department of Justice, Criminal Division, and Fraud Section. Before joining the Department of Justice, he worked in private practice in Washington, D.C. Mr. Spencer has taught trial advocacy and forensics at The George Washington University and the Federal Bureau of Investigation Academy in Quantico, Virginia. He is a graduate of Amherst College and the University of Chicago Law School.



Magistrate Judge Nita L. Stormes was appointed a U.S. Magistrate Judge for the Southern District of California in January 2000. For 16 years before taking the bench, she was an Assistant U.S. Attorney for the Southern District of California and served as Chief of its Civil Division from 1995 to 1999. She is a member of the Rules Committee for the Federal Magistrate Judges Association, a member of the Magistrate Judges Executive Board, and a member of the district court's Criminal Justice Act (CJA) Committee. She received her B.A., *summa cum laude*, from Ohio Wesleyan University and her J.D. from Duke University.



Kathleen M. Sullivan is partner and chair of the national appellate practice at Quinn Emanuel Urquhart & Sullivan, the nation's largest business litigation firm. When the firm named her to its marquee in March 2010, she became the first woman named partner at any AmLaw 100 firm. Formerly a professor of law at Harvard Law School and Dean of Stanford Law School, she remains on the Stanford faculty as Stanley Morrison Professor of Law, and continues to teach and write about a wide range of constitutional topics and to edit the classic casebook Constitutional Law (15th Edition, Foundation Press 2007). Ms. Sullivan holds a B.A. from Cornell University, where she was a Telluride Scholar, an M.A. from Oxford University, which she attended as a Marshall Scholar, and a J.D. from Harvard Law School, where she won the Ames Moot Court competition. She is an elected Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and an elected Member of the American Philosophical Society (founded by Benjamin Franklin).



Bankruptcy Judge Laura S. Taylor was appointed to the Bankruptcy Court for the Southern District of California on January 10, 2008. Prior to her appointment, Judge Taylor was a partner, associate and special counsel at Sheppard, Mullin, Richter & Hampton, where she practiced in the banking and finance practice group and specialized in commercial and bankruptcy law. She is a member of

the Ninth Circuit Conference Executive Committee, the Bankruptcy Judges Education Committee, founder of the San Diego Volunteer Lawyer Program's Special Education Project, and a former board member and board chair of the San Diego Regional Center for the Developmentally Disabled. Judge Taylor received her B.A. from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and graduated *summa cum laude* in 1979, and her J.D. from Duke University in 1983. She maintains chambers in San Diego.



Laurence H. Tribe is Senior Counselor for Access to Justice at the Department of Justice. He is on leave from Harvard University, where he is the Carl M. Loeb University Professor. Mr. Tribe has taught constitutional law at Harvard since 1968 and was voted Harvard Law School's best professor by the class of 2000. Fewer than 60 professors in Harvard University's history have been designated "University Professor," the university's

highest academic title. He is also a member of the President's Commission on White House Fellowships. Born in Shanghai, China in 1941 of Russian Jewish parents, he came to the U.S. in 1947, attended public schools in San Francisco, entered college at 16, graduated *summa cum laude* from Harvard in mathematics in 1962 and *magna cum laude* in law in 1966, then clerked for the California and U.S. Supreme Courts from 1966 to 1968 and spent a year at the National Academy of Sciences before joining Harvard's faculty, where he received tenure at 29. While teaching at Harvard, Professor Tribe helped write constitutions for South Africa, the Czech Republic, and the Marshall Islands. He is also a leading appellate advocate, having prevailed in some four-fifths of the many U.S. Circuit Court cases he has argued and three-fifths of the 35 U.S. Supreme Court cases in which he was lead counsel. He has written 115 books and articles, including his treatise, *American Constitutional Law 3rd*, (University Textbook Series 1999) cited more often than any other legal text since 1950 and his most recent book, *The Invisible Constitution*, published in 2008 by the Oxford University Press.



T. 'Aulani Wilhelm has been involved in conservation and management issues in Hawai'i for the past 12 years. She is currently superintendent for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) at Papahānaumokuākea Marine National Monument, the largest single conservation area under the U.S. flag and the world's largest marine protected area. The monument is co-managed by NOAA,

the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, and the state of Hawai'i. Previously, she served as the acting superintendent and as the acting reserve coordinator of

the Northwestern Hawaiian Islands Coral Reef Ecosystem Reserve, providing continuity of management and operations for the project since 2000. Preceding her work at NOAA, Ms. Wilhelm served for six years as the special assistant to the director and public information officer of the Hawai`i Department of Land and Natural Resources, where she was involved in numerous terrestrial and marine planning and policy initiatives. She has served on boards for many conservation projects and is a well-recognized leader in the protection and perpetuation of Hawai`i's natural and cultural resources. Ms. Wilhelm was *Phi Beta Kappa* and received her B.A. in political science and communication arts from the University of Southern California in 1991. She completed her elementary and secondary education in the Kamehameha Schools in Honolulu.



Chief District Judge B. Lynn Winmill was appointed a United States District Judge for the District of Idaho by President William J. Clinton on August 14, 1995. He practiced law in Denver, Colorado, from 1977 to 1979, and in Pocatello, Idaho, from 1979 to 1987. Judge Winmill was appointed a district judge for the Sixth Judicial District of the State of Idaho in 1987 and served as Administrative District Judge for the Sixth Judicial District from 1992 to 1995. He was an adjunct professor at Idaho State University from 1991 to 1995, teaching courses in criminal procedure and legal history. In addition to his regular Chief Judge duties within the District of Idaho, Judge Winmill has previously served on the Information Technology Committee for the Judicial Conference of the United States. He currently serves as Chair of the Ninth Circuit Information Technology Committee. This committee provides general policy recommendations, planning, and oversight for the Ninth Circuit's information technology program. He graduated from Idaho State University in 1974 and from Harvard Law School in 1977.




